5. Share state legislative priorities and bill drafts with potential impacts to regional plan implementation (FOR POSSIBLE ACTION)

Comments:

Members of the Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Steering Committee discussed legislative priorities and bill drafts. Each member provided a list of bills, priorities, and focus areas for their organization with potential impacts to implementation of the regional plan. The list is as follows:

City of North Las Vegas

- Assembly Bill (AB) 30: removes the citizenship requirement for hiring peace officers, including policemen allowing the hiring of resident aliens
- AB 31: recognizes Juneteenth as a state holiday

City of Las Vegas

- AB10: enables local governments to create transportation and housing reinvestment zones City of Boulder City
 - Bill draft request (BDR) allows municipalities to remove residential property from redevelopment area

Southern Nevada Health District

- Priority #1: establish a public health improvement fund
- Priority #2: codification to allow local entities to provide abortion service to minors without parental consent
- Priority #3: clarify and strengthen role of health officers during public health emergencies

Southern Nevada Water Authority

- Priority #1: changes to statutes governing septic to sewer conversions
- Priority #2: minor changes to AB 356
- Priority #3: codification of water conservation rules

Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT)

- AB 56: revises provisions relating to the operation of emergency vehicles on shoulder lanes
- BDR 801: relates to highway funding

Clark County School District

- Senate Bill (SB) 65: outlines skills and training requirements for board of trustees
- SB47: addresses barriers for teachers entering and maintaining employment and allows for investment in employee housing

Item:

Identify priority implementation actions for 2023 (FOR POSSIBLE ACTION)

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Ms. Deb Reardon, Manager of Regional Planning for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), discussed priority implementation actions for 2023. She noted that the last Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Steering Committee meeting focused on the themes of economic competitiveness, education, and complete communities. Then she presented the transportation goals implementation matrix, and each jurisdiction provided an update on activities related to the transportation theme.

Goal 1: Modern Transit System & Livable Centers

Ms. Reardon detailed the RTC's activities related to capital projects, regional planning, and state and local planning. Mr. Marco Velotta, City of Las Vegas, added the importance of understanding the impact of modal split and choices in terms of origin destination on ridership and encouraged the RTC to include anticipated changes in the next Regional Transportation Plan update. Vice Chair Nancy Amundsen, Clark County, and Ms. Annamarie Smith, City of Henderson, noted plans to update their respective jurisdictions' development codes through the Boulder Highway TOD Plan (Henderson) and the Transform Clark County (Clark County). Ms. Sondra Rosenberg, Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT), added that the statewide transit plan will focus on areas outside of the urban areas and create critical connections. Ms. Janet Quintero, United Way of Southern Nevada (UWSN), mentioned that the Nevada 211 Ride United project will provide non-emergency transportation and address transportation gaps via transportation network companies.

Goal 2: Bike and Ped Facilities

Next, Ms. Reardon reviewed the list of the RTC projects related to bicycle and pedestrian facilities. Members then added their projects to the list. Ms. Rosenberg noted that NDOT has funding available for local road safety plans and encouraged jurisdictions to apply. There are also plans for a statewide active transportation plan. Ms. Nicole Bungum, Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD), mentioned plans to apply for a Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) grant to support bicycle and pedestrian projects. Mr. Shawn Gerstenberger, University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV), discussed some of UNLV's research projects on neighborhood walkability, safe routes to school, and traffic/pedestrian safety.

Goal 3: Roadway Network for All Users

Continuing, Ms. Reardon highlighted the Henderson Sustainable Mobility Plan, Extreme Heat Vulnerability Interventions: Tree Canopy, Shade Analysis, and the Regional Open Space and Trails Workgroup Strategic Planning as projects related to the third goal. Chair Zane Marshall, Southern Nevada Water Authority, discussed a federal grant opportunity related to tree canopy projects as a possible project. Vice Chair Amundsen, Clark County, commented that the overall response from commercial property owners about adding electric vehicle infrastructure was positive. She also talked about the Clark County program that is offering funding to bring older vehicles erroneously registered as "classic vehicles" into compliance under new emissions laws. Additional clean transportation updates include: 1) SB244 provides funding for EV infrastructure and is administered by the Nevada Public Utilities Commission and NV Energy, and 2) NDOT has recently completed the NEVI Plan, and 3) Carbon Reduction Plan funds are available to support electrification.

Implementing Capacity

Next, Ms. Reardon presented the goals related to the implementing capacity theme.

Goal 1: Community Engagement

Under community engagement, she highlighted the proposed SNS Outreach Plan, the Bike and Pedestrian Temporary Pop-Ups integrated into upcoming scopes of work, and the Clark County Digital Equity Plan. Ms. Quintero discussed the Cross-Sector Language Access Coordination and the earmark for language access that was awarded to the UWSN from Congresswoman Dina Titus's office. She also spoke about the non-profit monthly meeting hosted by the UWSN that serves as a networking space and information resource on federal funding opportunities. Mr. Gerstenberger mentioned the Nevada Health and Equity Coalition at UNLV as a possible resource. Mr. Jared Luke, City of North Las Vegas, announced the opening of the Dolores Huerta Hispanic Resource Community Center.

Goal 2: Prioritize Regional Planning

Ms. Reardon discussed updating the SNS Regional Plan and working with the SNS Steering Committee members to define the scope of what changes are necessary. She also mentioned upcoming changes to the Performance Measures Dashboard. Vice Chair Amundsen suggested an evaluation of the priorities to determine which are still relevant.

Goal 4: Funding Strategies

Mr. Andrew Kjellman, Director of Metropolitan Planning Organization for the RTC, discussed project lists for funding from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). Capital projects related to the IIJA funding will be approved in a couple of months. A

call for projects for the UPWP will be released next week. Ms. Quintero and Ms. Rosenberg offered their respective agencies resources to assist with funding applications.

Ms. Reardon stated that the information from the discussion will be compiled and distributed to the SNS Steering Committee members.

3. Orient new Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Steering Committee members and meeting participants and receive a presentation on the SNS Regional Plan economic competitiveness theme and goals

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Ms. Deb Reardon, Manager of Regional Planning for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), explained that the Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Regional Plan serves as a blueprint for the specific goals and strategies that will make the region more sustainable economically, environmentally, and socially. The RTC is the core administrator of the Regional Plan. It examines the following four key themes: improve economic competitiveness and education; invest in complete communities; increase transportation choice; and build capacity for implementation. Ms. Reardon briefly outlined these goals and explained that the present meeting's discussion would focus on the first goal relating to economic competitiveness. Goals here are to support the implementation of SNS Opportunity Site plans and assist with the update of the region's comprehensive economic development strategy.

The Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Steering Committee members took a few moments to introduce themselves and their respective jurisdictions to the attending members.

Item:

5. Receive a presentation on statewide economic development planning and identify opportunities for regional collaboration

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Mr. Kristopher Sanchez, Nevada Governor's Office of Economic Development, described how the Southern Nevada region is undergoing changes in a post-pandemic world. It is vital to examine these changes to determine how to structure Nevada's future. He noted that, with 70 percent of the state's gross domestic product (GDP) coming from the region, it will be important to focus on alignment of planning at the regional level to support economic development. He stated it will be necessary to advance policy initiatives at the state level and ensure alignment of these goals moving forward.

Mr. Sanchez said that as part of the region's five-year comprehensive economic development strategy, there will be three pillars, or areas of focus, to consider, which include the following: Electric Nevada, Innovative Nevada, and Connected Nevada. Each of these pillars contains a series of goals and strategic action steps to support the region's growth. Mr. Sanchez explained that Nevada has three megapolitan clusters of note that influence how the state coordinates with each of the states nearby. These clusters are vital to consider when reviewing transportation networks and other regional strategies. Mr. Sanchez detailed three considerations that came out of early planning conversations. First, Southern Nevada has no legacy infrastructure and can be an early adopter of new technology. Second, Southern Nevada is not using a standard, regionally adopted planning model for forecasting. Third, consider what needs to be done to address the needs of a more diverse population in Southern Nevada.

Mr. John Restrepo, RCG Economics, explained that the recent draft of the 2021 Land Study has identified four paths forward as potential policy goals. This includes the following: economic impact modeling and analysis for 900 acres at APEX, analysis of existing land parcels in Southern Nevada, supply chain considerations, particularly with respect to southwest mining, and overall employment forecasts for the state. He reviewed how these variables were assessed in the land use report and how additional analyses were done on parcels to assess development opportunities. Mr. Restrepo noted that the region is at an inflection point for what must be done to accommodate development and economic resiliency strategies. Planning goals will need to become more pragmatic, and the region will need to become more aggressive in supporting partnerships to facilitate land use goals.

There are many resource challenges coming up, and efforts must stay focused to achieve results long-term.

Mr. Sanchez explained that with a finite amount of land available, planning efforts will become more important to better use what is available. There are many options on the table, but timelines restrict what is possible. He stressed that the land must be examined strategically to accommodate ongoing challenges. He then mentioned the impact of water, jobs, and company recruitment on resiliency. Particularly with the water aspect, new technologies are vital for improving efficiency. He stressed that Nevada was ranked well nationally for water usage and must continue to refine its strategies over time.

Mr. Andrew Woods, University of Nevada, Las Vegas Center for Business and Economic Research, described the jobs aspect of resiliency, noting how the pandemic and its associated recession have influenced the region's workforce. He reviewed basic data collected around migration patterns and how these forces affected Nevada's labor pool, noting that while people were returning to the area, the workforce is still recovering. Goals here must be focused on attracting workers back to the region.

Mr. Sanchez then reviewed the status of the Interstate-15 corridor and the need for synergistic components to make changes in the area, particularly in coordination with California. Particular care will need to be taken with supply chain logistics and transportation issues related to freight movement. Additionally, it will be important to review updates at the California legislature and how those affect transit.

Ms. Erin Hasty, Nevada Governor's Office of Economic Development, mentioned that there are 2021 funds available from the U.S. Economic Development Administration that could be apportioned to state planning. She stated that several options are being examined, including climate policies and solutions that fit specifically into Southern Nevada. Mr. David Damore, Brookings Mountain West, mentioned the value of putting solutions in the context of neighboring states and looking for opportunities.

Vice Chair Nancy Amundsen, Clark County, asked how changes to the industrial areas and airport land are being factored into the reviews. Mr. Restrepo said that it was difficult to forecast too far back in terms of modeling; the airport considerations were footnoted in the report.

Ms. Lisa Corrado, City of Henderson, mentioned the connection between land use and attracting a more competitive, educated workforce. Mr. Damore agreed, though he noted that some of those discussions are outside the scope of what is being done in these studies. Mr. Bill Arent, Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance, stated that it is helpful to focus on large development sites as well as infill sites. Many employers in the area require large amounts of space. He said the reality is that these needs must be balanced to accommodate different interests and that many variables will need to be considered. Mr. Restrepo stated that multipronged strategies will allow them to address different goals, including examination of zoning laws and regulations that affect companies.

Mr. Arent suggested that jobs in the future will be focused around the three categories of healthcare, information technology, and advanced manufacturing. Land use and zoning considerations will need to be considered along these lines as well as the long-term policy changes that will accompany them.

Mr. Restrepo agreed that the role of automation in these discussions will be important to consider. Mr. Woods briefly detailed the links between jobs that could facilitate economic development opportunities and how diversification should be a next step.

Item:

6. Provide input on Regional Planning Work Program tasks focused on transportation and regional economic development integration (FOR POSSIBLE ACTION)

Comments:

Following a detailed PowerPoint presentation [attached], Mr. Miguel Davila, Transportation Planner for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), detailed how the majority of population growth in the area will occur in the outskirts of the region. In modeling plans, these features will have problematic consequences for the area, including increased greenhouse gas emissions, vehicle miles traveled, and more. He noted that, according to research, infrastructure for transportation tends to disproportionately affect communities of color. He noted that Black and Brown communities currently make up 58 percent of the region. The purpose of this study will be to examine effects of urban planning along several lines, which include identifying vacant and underutilized parcels, assessing their development feasibility, creating a vacant land inventory, and incorporating infill development scenarios. Part of these efforts will involve examining how increased infill development could impact regional transportation models might change as strategies are built in. He said the overall goal will be to promote a regional infill development strategy that has transit equitability and sustainability in mind. Although models have been built to help visualize these scenarios, they are still in the conceptual stages.

Mr. Marco Velotta, City of Las Vegas, said that at this time, his jurisdiction has mixed-use and increased-density strategies applied but noted they are missing the zoning element. This means that developers are requesting accommodations that cannot be made. He said that stronger economic development tools would be helpful for assuaging these issues. Mr. Davila agreed that stronger coordination among jurisdictions would be supportive of driving the region-wide investments that are needed.

Mr. Rick Van Diepen, Urban Land Institute, mentioned that there is only so much infill potential left and that, inevitably, major redevelopments will need to be considered. Mr. John Restrepo, RCG Economics, stated that better assessments of which type of developments can be done are needed, but much of it is unknown at this point. Ms. Lisa Corrado, City of Henderson, agreed that improving improvement-value ratios will be important moving forward.

Ms. Sondra Rosenberg, Nevada Department of Transportation, noted that other costs must be considered in development, such as the social costs or opportunity costs of transportation. Options for transit are important for creating sustainability throughout the region.

Chair Zane Marshall, Southern Nevada Water Authority, stated that Bill 8220 had passed out of the Assembly and will be heard by the Senate Natural Resources Committee soon. He also mentioned a resolution to urge for greater river protections, which would be heard later that day.

Comments:

Ms. Deb Reardon, Manager of Regional Planning for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC), requested feedback from members on potential topics that might be of interest to those attending. She noted economic topics as well as more focus on housing and regional grants as potential areas of conversation.

Ms. Lisa Corrado, City of Henderson, suggested more focus on economic competitiveness and how to support those goals from a place-based perspective. She said that it could help to have more specific insight on what planning partners in local government could do to help. Ms. Deb Reardon, Manager of Regional Planning for the RTC, asked for clarification on what Ms. Corrado was requesting in terms of outputs. Ms. Corrado said that it would help to marry up the relationship between the target industry and the need for land. This may take the form of a study or other deliverable. Mr. John Restrepo, RCG Economics, said it would be helpful to focus around targeted industries matched with land use parcels.

Ms. Reardon mentioned the need for zoning in advanced manufacturing topics and asked which steps would be next in that process. Ms. Corrado said that a regional plan update could be warranted given that the last one was adopted in 2015. Mr. Marco Velotta of City of Las Vegas and Mr. Michael Mays of Boulder City agreed with Ms. Corrado. A plan update would help keep future efforts related to economic competitiveness on track. Ms. Reardon said a hybrid solution for next Steering Committee topics would be useful and that an agenda regarding next steps will be sent out to the group.

Mr. Shawn Gerstenberger, University of Nevada, Las Vegas, stated that regional grant coordination would be helpful, as the region's ability to bring in dollars could be improved. Mr. David Damore, Brookings Mountain West, mentioned June 20, 2023, as the next meeting date for Grant Labs, which could be helpful.

Mr. Andrew Kjellman, Director of the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the RTC, stressed the importance of planning for economic development and what infrastructure should be targeted.

Mr. Bill Arent, Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance, asked to clarify when Mr. Restrepo's study will be complete. Mr. Restrepo said the land study is in review and will be sent out soon.



19.0 POLICIES AND PROCEDURES GOVERNING THE SOUTHERN NEVADA STRONG **STEERING COMMITTEE**

CREATION AND PURPOSE 19.1

The Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee (Steering Committee) will coordinate and support implementation of the Southern Nevada Strong Regional Plan (Regional Plan). The Steering Committee will engage, educate and empower member organization's constituencies in Regional Plan implementation. The Steering Committee will assist RTC staff by providing valuable insight and guidance on 1) how Southern Nevada Strong can support his or her organization; and 2) region-wide activities and strategies Southern Nevada Strong can take to support implementation.

MEMBERSHIP

- A. The membership of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall consist of a senior management representative from each of the thirteen regional partners identified in the Regional Plan:
 - 1. City of Las Vegas
 - 2. City of Henderson
 - 3. City of North Las Vegas
 - 4. Clark County
 - 5. City of Boulder City
 - 6. Clark County School District
 - 7. Southern Nevada Regional Planning Coalition
 - 8. Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC)
 - 9. RTC Board Liaison
 - 10. University of Nevada Las Vegas
 - 11. Southern Nevada Water Authority
 - 12. Southern Nevada Health District
 - 13. Southern Nevada Regional Housing Authority
 - 14. Southern Nevada Conservation District
- B. The membership of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall also consist of the following community and special interests representatives:

 - Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco
 Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance
 Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department
 - 4. Nevada Department of Transportation
 - 5. United Way of Southern Nevada
 - 6. Urban Land Institute
 - 7. Brookings Mountain West
- C. Members of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall be selected by the entity, firm or agency they represent.
- D. Southern Nevada Strong Member Absences
 - 1. Excusal of an absence may be obtained by contacting the Steering Committee Chair, the RTC General Manager or his or her designee prior to the meeting at which the absence will occur.
 - 2. Steering Committee members must attend 75% of meetings over the course of a calendar year. If not, recommendations by the Chair, in consultation with the Vice Chair may be made to replace a Steering Committee member to ensure adequate representation and participation.
- E. Each Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee member shall have one vote.

- F. The terms of the members of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall be indefinite.
- G. For each member provided for in paragraphs (A) and (B), one alternate member may be appointed. Such alternate members will exercise all functions of the member in the member's absence. All members and alternates must be designated, in writing, to the RTC General Manager.

19.3 OFFICERS AND DUTIES

- A. A chair and vice-chair shall be elected annually, at the first meeting in October, from the voting membership of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee.
- B. The succeeding chair will officiate at the October meeting and will serve for 12 months.
- C. The chair shall preside at all meetings, call the meetings, and represent the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee at all meetings.
- D. In the event that the chair is unable to perform these duties, the vice-chair shall act in the place of the chair.

19.4 MEETINGS

- A. The Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall meet quarterly or as needed. Special meetings of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee may be called as directed by:
 - 1. The RTC
 - 2. The Chair of the Steering Committee
 - 3. The request of more than one-half of the membership
 - 4. The Chair of the RTC
- B. A simple majority of the Steering Committee's members shall constitute a quorum.
- C. The Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee shall follow a prepared agenda, subject to a publicly posted notice of a public meeting as required by the Nevada State law. Items for discussion or action at a Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee meeting must be submitted to the General Manager at least 12 working days prior to the meeting date. The General Manager may waive the 12 day requirement, in accordance with his or her authority pursuant to the RTC Administrative Procedures for Agenda Processing. The recommendations of the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee will be forwarded to the Regional Transportation Commission Board of Commissioners.
- D. The Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee has the authority to appoint working groups to serve a specific and exclusive purpose, which should be memorialized before it begins conducting its business. These working groups shall make recommendations to the Southern Nevada Strong Steering Committee for action.

19.5 ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

- A. Robert's Rule of Order will be used except as follows:
 - 1. Seconds will not be required for any motion
 - 2. The Chair can make motions and can vote on any motion.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

During the April 2023 Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) Steering Committee meeting, Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) staff was directed to explore an update to the SNS Regional Plan.
